Hello parents! This semester has flown by! It is hard to believe it is already time to send out performance information! As you know, we will be holding our dance performance the evening of **Tuesday, May 19th, at 7:00 PM in the Cheyenne Hills Church sanctuary**. Our mandatory dress rehearsal will be held earlier that same day. Exact times and more details will be sent to you when we have them all worked out!

We are doing a bit of a different costume for this class this semester! Normally we do a white shirt with a white skirt as a base, and then something like an overskirt or tunic on top. However, this class is going to be a different look this time. I am making a different type of skirt, and we will be doing black t-shirts and leggings underneath.

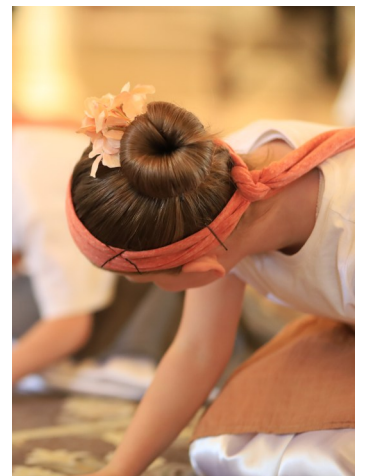
I will be making these skirts to keep for future classes, so you won't be buying these from me like we do with the white satin skirts.

The parts of your dancer's **COSTUME** that you will need to provide (and will be keeping) are the following:

- A loose fitting, short-sleeved black T-shirt that provides good coverage in all ranges of movement. Make sure it is long enough to cover their stomach when their arms are raised. This should be plain black, with no sparkles or writing. No low V or scoop necks please!
- Pink ballet shoes
- Black ankle length leggings (just like the ones we wear for normal classes). Make sure these are solid black, and no holes, please :)

HAIRSTYLE– Hair must be done in a nice neat bun, near the middle of the head (not too high, please!), so whatever supplies you need to make a bun, make sure you have those things on hand as well :) We will add hair accessories so that the whole class will match, so when you are putting her hair up, please make sure that the clips/pins/hairties you use blend with her hair color pretty well (no bright hair ties or scrunchies, please:)

MAKE-UP AND ACCESSORIES– No jewelry please, unless it's very small and discreet (like stud earrings). For make-up, I just want to let you know that the stage lights are not super bright, so we don't need extremely bold make-up. If you would like to use it, please just use it somewhat moderately, rather than heavy like a typical stage make-up job. Thank you so much!
